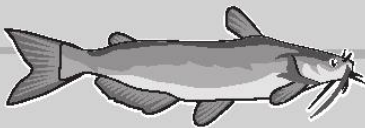
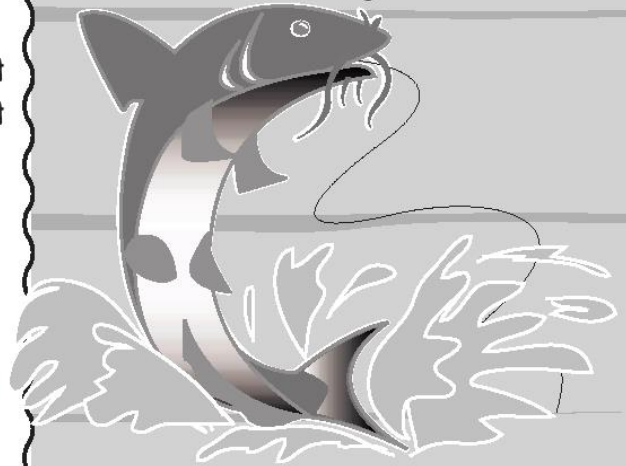

The largest is the **wels** or **danubian catfish** native to the rivers of central and eastern Europe and the only catfish found in British waters. It feeds mainly on fish, but will eat almost anything including frogs, rats, and water birds. In the large rivers of Russia such as the Dneiper it can reach over 650 pounds and a length of 16 feet; such fish are probably around a hundred years old.

The largest North American catfish is the **blue catfish**, which can grow to over 100 pounds although 20 to 50 pounds is more typical. Trophy size blue cats are obese specimens with enormous potbellies. Large blues feed on shad and other schooling baitfish and favor areas of heavy current while channel cats and flatheads prefer slow to moderate water flow.

The **glass catfish** of Asia, another small catfish sold for the home aquarium, is a true oddity of the catfish world being almost completely transparent!

The **channel catfish** can grow to 60 pounds, but most are less than 15 pounds. They are extremely adaptable and tolerate a wide variety of conditions. It will eat just about anything it can find, including live fish. The world record channel cat is a 58 pounder caught in South Carolina's Lake Moultrie.

White catfish are found primarily in the Eastern Coastal States down to the Florida Gulf Coast. White cats look like channel cats, but do not grow as large. They are somewhat tolerant of salty water. The world record white is 17 pounds, 7 ounces.

The **flathead catfish** is a brute of a fish, muscular and streamlined but ugly by all accepted standards. Flatheads have a squarish tail and a lower jaw that protrudes beyond the upper. Flatheads, like all catfish, are primarily nocturnal feeders. Big flatheads scavenge very little. They are predatory and prefer live fish as their major food source.

Africa's **electric catfish** grows to over 50 pounds. This aggressive fish can deliver an electric shock of 300 volts which it uses to stun its prey.

The **upside down catfish** of Africa is a popular aquarium pet. This small catfish lives out its life swimming upside down! Some upside down catfish have reversed shading, dark belly and light back. As is the case with smaller channel catfish, some make an audible grunting noise by pivoting their pectoral spines.

The **walking catfish**, native to Asia, was introduced apparently by aquarium owners into Florida waters in the late 1960's. It is abundant in southern and central parts of the state. It has an air breathing organ made of modified gill filaments and can walk over land on rainy nights using the tips of its stout pectoral spines and pivots as it propels itself along by flexing its body. A predator, walking catfish capture frogs and other food during their walks. Some species reach a length of 4 feet.
